


Little Dandelion Seeds the World Teacher's Guide

The Illustrators: Kristen and Kevin Howdeshell



English Language Arts



- Open the book to reveal the front and back cover. Describe what you see.
- Read the title aloud. What do you think the book is about?
- Who is the author? Who are the illustrators?
- Have you ever made a wish on a seedy dandelion? What do you think happens to the seeds after you blow?

After You Read:

- What does the text "fluff puffs" mean?
- Name two ways animals, humans, and the weather spread dandelion seeds.
- Water is vital to a dandelion's survival. What are two ways water is important to a dandelion?
- Name the seven continents. Describe how the illustrations depict different habitats on each continent.
- What is your favorite continent?

Writing Prompts:

- If you were a dandelion seed, where would you bloom? How would you travel?
- Dandelions are an important food source for animals. Many people think of dandelions as weeds. They spend money to spray chemical weed killers on their lawns to prevent dandelions from growing. Do you think people should spray their yards to kill dandelions? Why or why not?
- If you could be an animal that spreads dandelion seeds, what kind of animal would you be and why?
- Each dandelion seed is a perfect clone or copy of its parent. Would you like to be a clone? Why or why not?

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Social Studies



Research and Presentation:

Divide the class into groups of 3-4 students. Assign a continent to each group. Have students work together to research interesting facts, such as number of countries, population, important landmarks, natural resources, surrounding oceans. Use the table on page 9 to organize facts.

Have students create a physical presentation to share with the class about their assigned continent, such as a board game, flip book, shoebox diorama, or poster.

Have each group present their findings to the class. While students are speaking, have the other students record an interesting fact on the chart from page 9.



Math



Estimating and Counting by 10's




Bean Seed Game

Divide class into small groups. Fill clear plastic paper cups with bean seeds. Ask each student to estimate how many seeds

are in the cup. Have students count the bean seeds by placing them into piles of 10. Then count by 10's to determine the exact number of seeds. The student whose guess is closest to the actual number **wins!**

Rounding:

Practice rounding numbers to the nearest 10 or 100 using the seed themed word problems on page 10. Answer key to right.






Science

Dandelion Life Cycle:

Copy the printable worksheet on page 11. Have students cut, mix-up squares, and then paste on a new sheet of paper with arrows showing the correct order. Discuss how the seed head produces seeds and starts the sequence all over again.



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Seed Sprouting:

Supplies needed: Bean seeds Plastic bags Paper towels Tape

- 1. Soak bean seeds overnight. Drain off water when ready to start.
- 2. Have each student write their name on a plastic bag.
- 3. Have each student dampen a paper towel and fold it into the plastic bag.
- 4. Give each student 6 seeds. Ask them to place the seeds along one side of the paper towel. Press the seeds into the paper towel.
- 5. Seal the plastic bag and tape it to a window with the seeds facing the classroom.
- 6. Use the printable sheets on pages 12-13 to record daily observations.

Have a class discussion about predictions. Ask students to record their predictions:

- On what day will the outer coverings of the seeds pop open?
- On what day will sprouts appear?
- On what day will leaves appear?
- How many seeds will germinate?

Once leaves appear, ask students to compare their predictions with their observations.

Dandelion Fork Painting:

Supplies needed: Art paper Paint Paintbrushes Crayons Paper plates Plastic forks

Squeeze paint onto a paper plate. Dip fork into paint to make the blooms on the dandelions. Crayons can be used to make a vase or to add additional detail such as rainbows, birds, or butterflies.



Continent Paper Plate Art:

Supplies needed: Dinner size paper plates Blue paint/paintbrushes Scissors Crayons Glue


Print paper plate printable on page 16 of this guide.


